ADVENT: A TIME TO PREPARE THE WAY

We are drawing close to Advent — it begins on Sunday, November 27th. In the northern hemisphere, Advent coincides with the approach of winter. The days are shorter, the leaves have fallen, nature grows quieter as plants and animals prepare for the cold season. We as Christians are invited to slow down and take some quiet time during this season as well. Advent is a time of prayer and reflection and waiting in patient expectation. We wait for the birth of Christ, not only long ago in Bethlehem, but now, in our hearts and in the world. The world cries out in longing for redemption to be complete — the redemption that began with the incarnation and was further revealed in the resurrection of Christ from the dead.

Advent is a time for the renewal of hope, through spending time with God and reflecting on God's promises — the promise of a new heaven and a new earth, the promise of peace, and the promise of God's presence with us to the end of the age.

It is a struggle for most of us to observe Advent. Taking time for quiet prayer and reflection is counter to the culture of rushing around to make sure that all is in place for the perfect Christmas. I am reminding myself that Christmas is already perfect because our God took on flesh and came into the world out of love for each of us. The rest is details, and they will sort themselves out.

Here at Grace, we are offering the short evening service of compline on Monday nights during Advent at 8pm to give us all a chance to slow down, quiet our hearts, and listen for the voice of love speaking in our hearts. Join us if you can, and may this Advent be a blessed time for you.

Many thanks for the privilege of walking with you during Matt's sabbatical. May he return to us refreshed and renewed for the coming year.

HOME AND HOSPITALITY

On a beautiful fall afternoon recently, Zoe and I hiked up a carpet of fallen oak leaves to the top of a hill overlooking the Hudson Valley. I took a deep breath, thanked God, and thought to myself, It is good to be home. For me, this has also been a journey from and back home to Grace Church Millbrook, refreshed and renewed by a sabbatical journey and time for reflection. Thanks to a Lilly Foundation grant and the hard work and good wishes of you all at Grace, Mary and I were able to travel for two months around the world, mostly in the Far East, visiting Japan, South Korea, Vietnam and Singapore. We had a wonderful time (mostly) and I can't thank you all enough for the time and opportunity. I will be giving a series of talks on our travels on Sundays in December — and I have previously written short accounts along the way — so with this note I would like simply to tell a few stories.

On hospitality to strangers, I could tell many stories, for we found a gracious welcome in every country. In Japan we visited the small island of Miyajima near the city of Hiroshima. There is a famous temple and shrine there, as well as streets filled with shops selling souvenirs, food and the famous local green tea. We passed one such shop selling many kinds of paper and writing utensils — which had been doing so for generations. It also sold paper for shoji screens, and Mary and I mentioned to the owner that we have a project back home involving making sliding doors with shoji screens. Well, that was enough for the owner and his adult daughter to invite us to look over their goods more closely, talk about sizes and types, and before making a decision, have a cup of tea. We were ushered upstairs to a room covered with tatami mats, a small stove and utensils in one corner, a niche with a scroll and flower arrangement in another, and shoji screen windows open to the breeze. We sat while the young woman performed the classic Japanese tea ceremony with ground matcha tea carefully whisked into boiling water. She handed us simple but elegant stoneware bowls of tea and somewhat to my surprise (having previously tasted bitter green tea at such a ceremony) it was delicious. While we sipped our tea, she went to an adjoining room and played a song on a three stringed Japanese lute-like instrument. Our tour guide was amazed at this offering — this was not expected or arranged. But it was certainly a gift, a moment of grace.

Folks in Korea tend to be a bit more gruff than the Japanese, just as the food is more spicy, but the hospitality was still abundant. We found ourselves one night at Hahoe, a traditional village outside the small city of Andong. An annual mask dance festival was in process and one of the culminating events was a fireworks display. Ropes had been strung to the tops of cliffs across the river, and on the ropes hung strings of knotted paper. When darkness came, all went down to the shore to watch as the paper strings were lit and the ropes pulled across the river making sheets of falling sparks along the way. It was quite lovely—and dramatic when bonfire logs were rolled off the top of the cliffs and crashed on the rocks below. When it was over we walked back to where we had been told a special bus was coming but when it came, there were no seats left so we found a tight spot to stand. A middle aged man grabbed me by the wrist and pulled me over to the seat he had vacated, insisting I sit (did I look that old?). Next to him an old woman gestured to Mary, "Come, sit on my lap!" (Mary thanked her but preferred standing.)

Our son Eli joined us for a week in Vietnam — which was wonderful — and we had a great time exploring that dynamic developing country. After leaving Hanoi we flew to the old capital of Hue and after a couple of days took the train from there to Da Nang, the nearest rail station to our eventual destination in Hoi An. This was no high speed rail, as in Japan or Korea. This was the local route, and it left once a day at 11 out of an old station in a gritty part of town. We were standing on the platform, feeling a bit unsettled when a young man struck up a conversation. He was an immigrant from Vietnam to the US returning for a family event. He saw we were a bit nervous and was kind enough to assure us we were on the right platform for the right car, filling us in on the best way to get a cab in Da Nang and a good tailor in Hoi An if we wanted a custom suit made. The train came and we never saw him again, but we followed his advice and both Eli and I now have nice new custom-tailored suits.

I could go on — and will in my talks December 3 and 11 — about the beauty of natural wonders and architectural marvels that we were so fortunate to visit. We are home now and I look forward to resuming my work as a priest and pastor. Mary and I will treasure the memories of this trip for the rest of our lives. And I will remember that we all depend on the kindness of strangers, and should make haste to love, for time and life are too short for anything else.


RESURRECTION WINDOW GREETING CARDS
