



Stones and Bread Summer 2016

Right after being baptized at the hand of John the Baptist, Jesus went into the stark and stony wilderness of Judea. I think he was trying to figure out what make of the experience of being filled with the Holy Spirit and hearing a voice calling him "my Son, the Beloved." He fasted for forty days and was famished. The tempter came and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread." But Jesus answered, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but every word that comes from the mouth of God'" (Matthew 4:1-4).

Stones and bread. The two come together again during the Sermon on the Mount, where, speaking of God answering prayer, Jesus asks the rhetorical question: "Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for bread, will give a stone?" (Matthew 7:9).

Of course not. How much more then will God give good things to those who ask, Jesus concludes.

Yet many still go hungry, for both food and the Word of God.

“You can do it. We can help”—so goes the advertising slogan for Home Depot (or Lowe’s—I’m not sure which). I noticed a similar slogan on a sign seeking volunteers at the Union Vale firehouse in Verbank: “U can do it, we’ll teach you how.”

You can’t be a one person fire department. Even the smartest and hardest-working handyman needs materials and instruction. And even God looks for help in spreading the good word and feeding the hungry: otherwise there would be flashing commandments in the sky and manna raining down on earth. The Bible records the occasional miracle, but the usual means of grace seems to be sending revelation and wisdom through prophets and sages of many sorts—and preeminently in Jesus, the incarnate Word of God. He shows the Way. Not by miraculously turning stones into bread (though there’s an occasional multiplication of loaves and fishes), but by gathering a community and teaching them to love one another and feed the hungry and in all ways work together to hasten the coming of what he called the kingdom of God, the reign of love and justice God intends for earth as well as heaven.

We call it **church, this place of grace** where the word of God and the needs of the people are both addressed. “We worship God and learn from Jesus, love one another and work together to transform lives and participate in God’s mission of reconciliation and new creation.” So reads our newly adopted “Grace Church Mission Statement.” At first, you may come to church to meet an individual need for spiritual connection to God. What many also find at Grace is friendship and joy, meaning and service: the word and bread of life.

Have a great summer. Fire up the barbecue. Love God and your neighbor. We are all one in Christ.

Episcopal Charities

Episcopal Charities is the outreach arm of the Episcopal Church in New York. Money is raised through the diocesan budget, an annual fund-raising dinner held at the Cathedral of St John the Divine (a wonderful event—I encourage you to hold this year’s date: November 10), and through individual donations and parish appeals (this is ours). A small but dedicated staff and board solicit grants and make grant allocations to many Episcopal organizations serving a wide variety of community needs. The work is impressive and well worth supporting as one of the most effective charitable organizations in our area.

Consider their work on the issue of food scarcity. As Bishop Dietsche writes, “Just over a million people residing within the footprint of the Diocese live in poverty. For many, hunger may not be a constant, but it is always a threat. One unexpected medical bill or car repair can strain the family budget to the point where hunger becomes a very harsh reality. Many of those seeking sorely-needed food will find it at 48 parish-affiliated feeding programs supported by Episcopal Charities. Last year, these community kitchens, food pantries and brown-bag lunch programs provided hungry New Yorkers with 6.7 million meals! This amazing outpouring of help...and love... is a tribute to the feeding programs themselves and all those who choose to help the hungry through their support of Episcopal Charities.”

One such program that Episcopal Charities provides major support is the food pantry at St Thomas Amenia; this of course is a program we at Grace helped start and still support with human and financial resources. Grace Church also receives grants from Episcopal Charities for our Grace Latino Outreach program and for our regional youth leadership development program, EPIC.

The bottom line: we are part of a circle of care. What goes around, comes

around. The measure you give will be the measure your receive (that last one is Jesus). So I urge you to give to Episcopal Charities, either through the individual donation button on their website, or by sending a check to Grace with the memo line: Episcopal Charities. We will bundle and send on.

Warden's Corner

Want to feel better about the world? Check out some of the things going on at Grace!

On Friday June 3rd, I attended the final EPIC (Engaging People In Change) meeting and dinner, which was run entirely by the kids. This program was designed to help young people learn the power they have over their own lives and how they can effect positive change in the world. This was a new program launched by Grace Church, but funded mostly from grants. I really wasn't sure what to expect. Normally when programs like this are just getting started, the first year presents slim-pickings. Not so here. Thanks to very hard work by Abby Nathanson, students were recruited from multiple school districts, and from varying backgrounds. For some, English is a second language. The participants presented highlights from their year together. Their families were present to share in their accomplishments (and provided very tasty food as well - thanks parents!). I was so impressed by the confident, articulate group I met. They spoke so passionately about this program, and what it meant for them. I had a chance to see them talk about conferences they attended, and presentations they made at those conferences. I left the dinner feeling thankful, and hopeful - seeing young people engaged, empowered and so passionate about what this program meant for them. It also left me feeling proud that Grace Church is pioneering these types of initiatives.

Another very affirming event was the Solidarity Walk to support the Muslim community that I attended. Coordinated through Dutchess Interfaith Council, the plan was an interfaith march across the Walkway over the Hudson Bridge, followed by a dinner. There were a small group of hearty souls who met at the bridge with the best of intentions. After a few minutes of non-relenting torrential rain, we decided the better part of valor was to take a few pictures, and call it a march. I left the bridge, drenched, and expecting only a

handful of attendees at the First Evangelical Lutheran Church for dinner. Much to my surprise and delight, over 200 people came for dinner - including Jews, Christians, Muslims, and Hindus. We sang, we prayed, we talked, we listened. We rejoiced. And we ate. As Episcopalians well know, you hold a potluck dinner, worry there won't be enough food, and you end up with enough food to feed an army. It was a joyous event, and so renewing to see how many good, prayerful and loving people are right here in our community, trying to make the world a better place. Stewardship Letter

Dear friends, beloved in Christ,

We write to ask you to make a financial commitment to Grace Church, if you have not already done so. The majority of our members—73 individuals or families—pledged in the fall of 2015; but another 54 have not. Plus, we have welcomed more than 25 individuals to the church since then. Non-pledging and new members together are more than the number of our pledging households. Imagine the mission and ministry we could do if we had more resources to support them!

Consider what we are doing already, as we have just finished up a “program year.”

- Multiple worship services every week: two on Sunday, one on Wednesday, including several ecumenical services and an interfaith service at Innisfree Garden; growing attendance and plans for a monthly bilingual service. The Gospel is being preached and the sacraments administered faithfully (with joy and good music too!).
- Many pastoral offices: baptisms, marriages, funerals; counseling; caregiving support; including a new parish nurse program.
- Education programs for all ages, including a new regional youth leadership program (EPIC) and Episcopal multi-congregation group (Connect), and adult Bible study.
- A growing Grace preschool and childcare on Sundays; an expanded playground with help from an extraordinary group of Grace preschool parents and staff under the leadership of Maureen Satma
- Continued improvements in the buildings and grounds, including new heating and cooling systems to save energy and money.
- Growing regional impact through outreach ministries such as Grace Latino Outreach, food partnerships (with St Thomas and the Lunchbox),

EPIC, and our reinvigorated Church Alliance partnership on senior issues in our village and region.

- A strategic plan—Grace 2020— developed by the Vestry, to be communicated in detail over the summer.

And, as sports fans are fond of saying, wait till next year!

- Continued work on objectives of the strategic plan, including a program to be launched in the fall for growing church attendance and membership (Invite, Welcome, Connect), and a program in the spring to evaluate and enhance spiritual vitality in our congregation (RenewalWorks).
- Continued expansion of our youth groups—together with preparation for an exciting young adult program.
- Formal launch of our “food/farm/faith initiative”—positioning Grace as a catalyst and convener in the Hudson Valley’s growing local food and sustainable farm movements, together with other faith communities involved in food scarcity and justice issues, and care of creation. Stay tuned for an announcement on this.

I am excited by what is happening here at Grace—and I hope you are too. Spread the good news. And, if you haven’t yet, help to support the work with a pledged financial contribution. You, of course, must be the judge of how much you can give. What matters most to me is to get participation by all, or almost all of our members. So if you do consider yourself a member of this wonderful church, please prayerfully consider how you can best support our mission and ministry and fill out and send in the enclosed pledge card. Linda Hogan, the chair of our dedicated stewardship committee, and I thank you.

Grace Vision 2020: a strategic plan in process

Let's grow! That was the call to action in our Mutual Ministry Review meeting in March of 2015. Fr. Masud led the Vestry and me through an exercise in Appreciative Inquiry that identified the strengths of the congregation and leadership of Grace, looked at our recent history and current challenges, and came up with a list of hopeful goals for the future. The thread was growth. Growth in three dimensions:

1. Growth in numbers (attendance, membership, stewardship)
2. Growth in spiritual vitality
3. Growth in regional impact.

Our second strategic planning meeting, in September of 2015, used an exercise from a book the Vestry was studying: *Becoming a Blessed Church*. The book's main focus was to remind church leaders that faithful planning begins with seeking God's will through prayer. But it also includes exercises to clarify how to focus the work we feel called to do. The exercise helped us to identify key program areas of the church. We think the church has four main programmatic pillars and two supplemental but vital program areas:

1. Worship (our core purpose)
2. Discipleship (education for all ages; transforming lives)
3. Fellowship (building a caring and faithful community)
4. Partnership (reaching out to the wider community to participate in God's mission of reconciliation and new creation).
5. Stewardship (resourcing the mission)
6. Communication (internal and external; clear and true; spreading the good news of God in Christ).

Using the insights developed in these two meetings, we drafted the following **mission statement**: "The mission of Grace Church is to worship God, learn from Jesus, love one another, and work together to transform lives and participate in God's mission of reconciliation and new creation."

Our third planning meeting got into the details of how we plan to meet the three goals and advance the mission of our church. Each program area was the subject of brainstorming and then sorting and prioritizing until a set of clear objectives emerged. These are the concrete items we are either working on now or hope to implement soon. The list is fairly detailed—and was carefully reviewed in subsequent Vestry meeting. The full details will be posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall—which is in the process of being refurnished after the move of Gracie's Attic to the Millbrook Antique Center. But here are the big ones, matching the main goals:

1. Growth in numbers: We started last fall with a new stewardship program, *New Consecration Sunday*. We will be launching a program for congregational growth in the fall of 2016 modeled to some extent on a program from the diocese of Texas called *Invite, Welcome, Connect*. This is both a challenging and exciting time to be a church. We need to adapt to a new day and diverse demographic while holding on our great tradition and local roots.
2. Growth in spiritual vitality: We have launched new worship services and a Bible study; in the fall of 2016 we will begin an adult forum on Sunday morning. In the spring of 2017 we will participate in the diocesan-supported spiritual vitality program called *RenewalWorks*. This program begins with a survey tool to assess our current state, looks at best practices around the country and concludes by advocating steps to move people farther on their spiritual journey and deeper in their life in Christ.
3. Growth in regional impact: already in process through development of Grace Latino Outreach and EPIC, our regional youth leadership program. We

are also planning a young adult ministry, working on senior issues and developing a food/farm/faith initiative. Our local group of Episcopal parishes in NE Dutchess has been meeting and working together. The buzz is good.

Whether all of this hard work will end with the hoped-for results of dynamic growth, God alone knows. You've heard the quip: if you want to make God laugh, make a plan. Still, you are more likely to hit a target if you aim. And why not aim high? After all, Jesus started small, just a few disciples. There are around two billion today all around the world.

Our goal is more modest: over one hundred average Sunday attendance, diverse in age and background, with meaningful, sacramental, and moving worship; a similar number of pledging individuals and households, along with other streams of income and mission resources. A learning community growing in faith, where joy and peace are products of transformed lives. A place where all are welcome, no one remains a stranger, and from which we follow Christ into the world. That's our vision for Grace 2020. Looks good to me; how about you? Let me and members of the Vestry know what you think. Let's grow together!
